PUBLIC COMMENTS RELATED TO VIRGINIA'S HUD NDRC APPLICATION

A. Summary of Comments Presented at the HUD NDRC Public Hearing and

Electronically, Organized by Topic with Response:

1. Comments Related to Model Approaches, Studies, and Projects in Areas with Similar Flooding Issues

Three commenters asked if the project team had considered solutions in Europe, citing approaches in the Netherlands and Russia. When it came to physical infrastructure solutions, the commenters did not want to “reinvent the wheel” highlighting the fact that other countries had found viable solutions to living with flooding. There was concern about raising houses if the related infrastructure (e.g., roads, power lines, pump stations) was not also relocated or altered to mitigate flooding loss. One commenter wanted to know if there were any available models of communities who had successfully leveraged water mitigation activities for economic development and well-being among their most vulnerable residents. Finally, one participant noted that the media often referred to studies that had been done in the region and he wanted to know where to find more information and access to the reports.

Response: Participants were informed that water management models and options being utilized domestically and internationally would be considered. There is an ongoing “Dutch Dialogue” with the Netherlands since they are recognized as world leaders and this will continue to inform decisions. Additionally, the Resiliency proposal does offer an opportunity to explore innovative ideas and part of this may be the development of a living lab in the region that would be utilized to develop and test strategies, which may include a business accelerator facet to spur local innovation and business development.

2. Comments Clarifying Understanding of the NOFA and HUD Terminology

One commenter asked why Hurricane Irene (2011) was cited as Virginia's qualifying event for the competition and not Hurricane Isabelle (2005). Another commenter asked if the grant required a certain percentage (51%) benefit to LMI residents and whether HUD funds could be used in other neighborhoods. She also asked for a definition of livability principles and was referred to HUD's website where this term is defined. A number of questions were focused on projects and more pertinent to Phase II of the competition. For example, someone asked about best practices within the grant approach such as direct assistance to homeowners, elevating houses, and enhancing emergency services to our most vulnerable citizens.

Response: Participants were informed that Hurricane Irene was cited as a qualifying event because it was specifically noted in the program guidelines and that proposals were bound to Virginia's qualifying event. Participants were told of the three National Objectives used to qualify activities under the proposal and that the majority of benefit was targeted to low- to moderate- income persons, which was based on 80 percent of the area median income. There was a brief discussion of the HUD livability principles and participants were informed the DHCD website would be updated with a link to the principles (this was subsequently completed). Participants with questions about specific projects were told that more detail would come in the next phase of the proposal development and that in this initial phase, the emphasis is on demonstrating the need, capacity, commitment, and general concept for Virginia's proposal. It was noted that activities such as house elevations would be considered but the intent was to look for larger impact, regionally focused solutions.

3. **Comments Encouraging Better Communication**

One commenter requested better communication to citizens as the initiative feels remote to those who are not directly involved. He asked that regional studies and reports be centralized on a website and better explained in the media coverage.

Response: It was acknowledged that there are a number of reports and studies on the topic of climate change, sea level rise, and recurrent flooding, and the idea of consolidating those into one repository was a good suggestion and would be further discussed.

4. **Comments Related to Flood Insurance Cost**

One commenter asked if the project would improve Norfolk's Community Rating System as it relates to the National Flood Insurance Program and thereby decrease flood insurance premiums. He also wanted to know if property owners would be able to deduct premiums from their income taxes. One commenter, a Floodplain Manager for the Virginia Department of Conservation and Recreation, said that the Community Rating System would be enhanced by projects funded under the HUD CDBG National Disaster Resilience Competition.

Response: The representative from the Department of Conservation and Recreation was thanked for her remarks. Participants were informed that one possible outcome of the initiative could be the completion of activities by other Hampton Roads localities to bring them into the Community Ratings System program.

5. **Comments Indicating Interest in Providing Resources for Projects**

One commenter who worked in the construction industry with a focus on transportation stated that he had identified a proven model from Europe and would be willing to work with

partners in the Phase II project development stage. The Hampton Roads Realtors Association (HRRA) offered the vast knowledge of their membership as a resource in private property management and community vitality. HRRA presented their organization as a resource for disseminating information to help unite the region and strengthen neighborhoods around resiliency efforts.

Response: Speakers were thanked for their comments. A proposal for a construction project was accepted from one speaker. The Realtors Association subsequently followed up with a phone call to express their support and to explore opportunities to partner.
